No doubt, many of you may have a "curiosity" regarding the granite Sacred Heart Parish monument/obelisk now standing in the right, front lawn as you enter the church. The monument is a gift, erected to serve two purposes.

Not quite a year ago, the Sacred Heart Catholic Education Endowment Fund (SHCEEF) was established by a transformative gift from the John R. Post Family Charitable Foundation. The monument commemorates that gift to benefit Sacred Heart Parish, in its mission ...to teach all nations..., in providing a quality Catholic education to the children of our parish and beyond. It also replaces the tired lawn sign that stood on the hill in the upper garden to the right of the church.

Additionally, as part of this transformative gift, the Post Family Charitable Foundation has challenged our parish and school community to partner in this philanthropic effort. If we as a parish/ school community are able to raise \$700,000 before 31 December 2023, the Post Family Charitable Foundation will award the SHCEEF

with an additional \$500,000 donation. I am confident that we can meet the challenge!

Since the establishment of this Endowment, we have worked and continue to work diligently to achieve this incentive goal. Unfortunately, the pandemic has greatly restricted us from introducing this initiative to potential benefactors in a face-to-face manner as well as being able to invite the parish and local community as a whole to participate in this undertaking. We hope you will prayerfully consider supporting this noble cause. No contribution is too small *OR* too large. #### History of St. Valentine

The first St. Valentine was a priest and physician in Rome. He along with St. Marius and his family comforted the martyrs during the persecution of Emperor Claudius II, the Goth. Eventually, St. Valentine was also arrested, condemned to death for his faith, beaten with clubs, and finally beheaded on Feb. 14, AD 270. He was buried on the Flaminian Way. Later, Pope Julius I (333-356) built a basilica at the site which preserved St. Valentine's tomb. Archeological digs in the 1500s and 1800s have found evidence of the tomb of St. Valentine. However, in the thirteenth century, his relics were transferred to the Church of Saint Praxedes near the Basilica of St. Mary Major, where they remain today. Also, a small church was built near the Flaminian Gate of Rome which is now known as the Porta del Popolo but was called in the 12th century "the Gate of St. Valentine," as noted by the early British historian William Somerset (also known as William of Malmesbury, d. 1143), who ranks after St. Bede in authority.

The popular customs of showing love and affection on St. Valentine's Day is almost a coincidence with the feast day of the saint: During the Medieval Age, a common belief in England and France was that birds began to pair on Feb.14, "half-way through the second month of the year." Chaucer wrote in his "Parliament of Foules" (in Old English): "For this was on Seynt Valentyne's day, When every foul cometh ther to choose his mate." For this reason, the day was dedicated to "lovers" and prompted the sending of letters, gifts, or other signs of affection.

The love of our Lord, depicted beautifully in the image of His most Sacred Heart, is a sacrificial, self-less, and unconditional love. Such is the love that each Christian is called to express in his own life, for God and neighbor. Clearly, St. Valentineno matter which one showed such a love, bearing witness to the faith in his dedication as a priest and in the offering of his own life in martyrdom. them, and thanking them for their love in return. Never forget Jesus said, "This is my commandment: love one another as I have loved you. There is no greater love than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" (Jn 15:12-13). St. Valentine fulfilled this command, and may we do the same.
