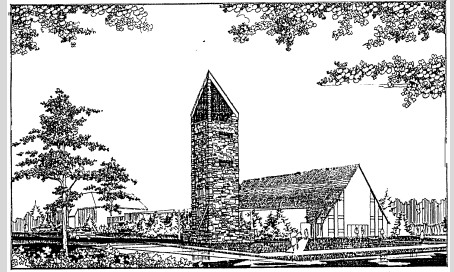

What is Eucharistic Adoration & Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament?

- * Adoration is specifically prayer in the presence of the Most Blessed Sacrament whether in front of a closed Tabernacle or exposition in a monstrance.
- * Eucharistic Adoration dates back to the early Church. It involves exposing a consecrated host, the Most Blessed Sacrament, allowing adorers to pray in the presence of Jesus, in a formal public way.
- * Exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament is specifically prayer in front of the exposed host in a monstrance.
- * During Eucharistic Adoration it is appropriate to...

Read and reflect on Scripture or spiritual writings

Pray: the Rosary, Divine Mercy Chaplet, Litany of the Eucharist, or Sacred Heart.
Converse with God through spontaneous prayer or sit quietly and listen in the presence of Christ.
